PROFILE

Founded over 50 years ago by the Felician Sisters, St. Anthony High School is a private, co-educational institution (grades 9-12), located in the urban community of Jersey City, Hudson County, NJ -- recognized as 1 of the top 2 most culturally diverse cities in the United States.

St. Anthony's commitment to academic and athletic excellence through a demanding program of study seeks to cultivate self-discipline, personal growth, career development and spiritual enrichment. As a Catholic institution, it promotes spiritual awareness and instills the values of service and charity through volunteer efforts in the local community and parishes. Students benefit from the countless opportunities to enrich their learning experiences through activities, mentoring programs, corporate internships and proximity to Manhattan as well as Jersey City's thriving financial district, known as "Wall Street West."

Accredited by the Middle States Commission of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the high school operates independently under the authority of the Archdiocese of Newark.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT 2011-2012

St. Anthony High School serves a population of 244 students: 185 boys and 59 girls. Although the student body is comprised mainly of Jersey City residents, the population encompasses students from over 10 counties in NJ as well as out-of-state residents from the tri-state area. The male to female ratio is 3 to 1.

The Class of 2012 consists of 51 students: 38 males, 13 females.

CURRICULUM

St. Anthony's curriculum is grounded in the liberal arts tradition with an emphasis on the Humanities, Natural Sciences, Social Sciences, and Writing to Learn. Electives include African-American History, Contemporary World, Philosophy, Physics, Psychology, Political Science, Sociology, Visual Arts, Music Theory, and Composition & Writing. A Visual & Performing Arts Program is currently being re-established in the 2011-2012 Academic Year.

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

In order to receive a diploma, students must successfully complete a total of 128 credits that include:

- 4 years of English
- 4 years of Math
- 4 years of Religious Studies (+25 hours of Community Service)
- 3 years of History
- 2 years of Lab Science
- 2 years of Foreign Language
- 2 years of Physical Education/Health/Driver's Ed.

CLASS RANK

Rank is based on overall cumulative GPA and includes all courses. Advanced Placement and Honors courses are weighted. Completion of Summer School Recovery Courses results in a grade of 70%; this replaces the failing grade in the cumulative GPA. Students transferring from other institutions are ranked solely on their years of attendance at St. Anthony.

Currently ranked #1 in the nation (2010-2011), finishing on top of 20,000 schools throughout the country, the Boys Basketball Team has earned a total of 4 national championships, 26 state championships, and 6 undefeated seasons (1974, 1989, 1996, 2004, 2008, and 2011).

The program has been responsible for over 150 Division I basketball scholarships, 5 first-round NBA draft picks and 2 Major League Baseball players.
